DOES GOD WANT US IMMUNE TO SICKNESS

The positive confession movement is an extremely popular movement in evangelicalism. Positive confession proponents believe that faith is a force and through using positive words these people can manipulate this faith force and actually create what they believe Scripture promises them: most often that means health, riches and material possessions. This idea is also called the movement because it teaches that if Christians use this faith force to confess something that we want from God, then God is obligated to see that we get what we have confessed.
Part of this positive confession doctrine is that God doesn't want us sick. The rationale is this: Jesus Christ was crucified for our sins and our sicknesses. Since God wants our souls saved from sin God must also want our bodies healed from sickness and since this is something God wants, it is consistent with His word for us to confess that healing.
The problem is that teaching is based on a false premise and that false premise is that present time healing is both available and even in Christ's atonement on the cross.
Definition: Atonement is Explanation:
There are three basic proof-texts Positive Confession people use in an attempt to reinforce this teaching that healing is guaranteed in the atonement:
ONE Isaiah 53:4-6 (see screen)
TWO I Peter 2:24 (see screen)
THREEMatthew 8:14-17 (see screen)
Notice the two statements: the original statement from Isaiah and then the quotation of that same statement from Matthew. Isaiah said, "Surely He (Messiah) has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows." Matthew said, "He Himself (Messiah) took our infirmities and bore our sicknesses."
