## THE THEOLOGY OF LOVE Part V

"Love is not envious"

Reference: I Corinthians 13:1-13

Characteristic Onelove is <b>patient</b> Characteristic Twolove is <b>kind</b> Characteristic Threelove is not <b>envious</b>
verse four, "Love suffers long and is kind, love does not envy"
Starting at this third statement about love, Paul begins a string of eight consecutive characteristics that describe what love is not, and the first thing love is not is that it is not envious.
Most people assume that envy and jealousy are one and the same thing because in normal conversation the two words are sometimes used on an interchangeable basis; but, although the words are closely related to one another, in a strict sense, the words represent two distinct emotions.
Being <b>envious</b> means someone wants to what someone else has.  Being <b>jealous</b> means someone wants to continue to what he already has and he doesn't want someone else to have it.
That's also the reason God is said to be a jealous God; but, nowhere in Scripture does it state that God is an envious God. Reference: <b>Exodus 34:14</b> (see screen)
It has been suggested that envy exists in two basic forms:  • envy
<b>Definition</b> : This envious form is that we what someone else has.
envy     Definition: This envious form is that we want what someone else has so much that we actually them to have it.
In the original Greek language, the root word for envy means "to" because being envious can be this internal seething and boiling and steaming up on the inside because someone else has succeeded above us.

One of the classic biblical passages that illustrates this problem is foun in Matthew's gospel.  Reference: Matthew 20:1-15 (see screen)
Let's pull from this biblical narrative four strategic steps that can help ricourselves of an envious attitude.
STEP ONE is to the comparison games. verses ten through twelve (see screen)
<ul> <li>We are</li> <li>Comparing has the potential to result in two different sins: or or both.</li> </ul>
STEP TWO is to in the fact God has blessed someone else.  verses thirteen through fourteen (see screen)
STEP THREE is to be with what we have.  verse fifteen (see screen) The concept of contentment is taught throughout Scripture. Reference: I Timothy 6:8; Philippians 4:11b (see screen)
<b>Definition</b> : Contentment is defined as being with what God has for me.
