PROBLEM: Secularists, humanists, agnostics, atheists, evolutionists, etc. and more and more evangelical Christians do not accept Genesis of

chapters one through eleven as the authentic, literal record of the origin of all that exists. Some evangelicals want to accommodate modern peological science and evolutionary theories and so interpret the first part of Genesis as either poetic, exalted prose narrative, symbolic, allegorical, mythical, and/or parable-like stories.	
That perspective has resulted in three principle counter-theoretical positions to the literal biblical Genesis creation account creationism (day-age theory) evolution (evolutionary creation) - The gap-theory (also called the and theory)	
Sap theory proponents: Thomas Chalmers (1780-1847), C.I. Scofield 1843-1921) and the Scofield Reference Bible, Clarence Larkin, Chuck <i>I</i> lissler, etc.	
Sap theory explanation: One huge problem in the gap theory is that it puts on a nassive scale before the first man Adam and that's a serious problem.	
Reference: Romans 5:12 , "Therefore, just as through one man sin entered the world and death through sin and thus death spread to all men, because all sinned-"	
REASONS FOR THE LITERAL INTERPRETATION OF GENESIS 1-11:	:
ONE: understand this to be the case	
WO: the principle characters mentioned in Genesis chapters 1-11 are eferred to as (not mythical) personalities throughout the rest of Scripture	
Example: Adam, Eve, Cain, Abel, and Noah are referenced in other biblical books Genesis first eleven chapters contain geographical terms, personal names, generic names, and at least identifiable cultural items (such as gold, onyx, brass, iron, gophe	

wood, mortar, brick, stone, harp, pipe, cities, towers, etc.).

	Jesus referenced the creation of Adam and Eve as an actual historical occurrence (He quoted from Genesis 1:27, 2:24 and 5:2) in His teaching on divorce (Reference: Matthew 19:3-6; Mark 10:2-9)
	Jesus also referenced Noah as an actual historical character and the flood as an actual historical catastrophe (Genesis 6-9) His teaching on the second coming (Reference: Matthew 24:37 39 and Luke 17:26-27)
	There are passages from Genesis that are quoted or referenced in the New Testament and then alluded to some more times.
FOUR:	the non-literal interpretation of Genesis undermines essential
	Every essential Christian doctrine is, in a direct sense or indirect sense, found in Genesis chapters one through eleven.
	Example: Paul's presentation of is contingent on a historical man named Adam and the literal reading of the Genesis account as to how mankind sinned. Reference: Romans 5:12-19 (see screen)
	Example: Paul's explanation of the has no meaning if there was no historical Adam. Reference: I Corinthians 15:20-22 and 45-49 (see screen)
