THE SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE

Christians are being told that the First Amendment to the United States Constitution includes a clause that calls for the separation of church and state. This supposed clause is being used to restrict religious freedom and ban Christianity from an increasing number of government and or public arenas.

First amendment to the US Constitution: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

Related to the subject of religion, the first amendment was designed to do two fundamental things:

One of the supposed biblical arguments used to teach the doctrine of separationism is found in the book of Matthew.

Reference: Matthew 22:15-21 (see screen)

verse 21b, "And He (Jesus) said to them 'Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's and to God the things that are God's."

Social liberals and constitutional separationists interpret that phrase to insist that Jesus made a distinction between Caesar and God so that in effect Jesus has endorsed a definite separation between government and religion; however, Jesus was just emphasizing that men were to pay taxes to the head of a government as a human ruler, but not homage to him as a god. Jesus was not advocating separating human society from religion and religious influence.
